"Death to the Gypsies"

That's what the graffiti reads. It's painted on a wall right outside of a popular teenage hangout, and we pass it often as we take our children to the coffee shop for a treat. Thankfully our children can't yet read, but we know that you don't have to be literate to inherit messages and worldviews from society.

"If he would just get a job, then he could buy a window for their house." Elin was grappling with understanding why our new Roma friends couldn't afford to put in a window or door of their one-room shack that housedat least 3 adults and 3 children. When we visited Fran* and Jean Claud's* house on a relatively warm day for a Romanian November, their wood-burning stove kept the closet-sized room warm enough. And we know that when 6 people share one double-sized bed, sheer body heat can help them survive, but we know that once winter really hits soon, it won't be a particularly comfortable place to live. Yet I still can't wrap my mind around their centuries of existence in their separationist Roma culture, especially when I'm confronted by the reality that their bathroom is a corner in their front yard where they simply squat by a fence. Elin has been learning about the poor in our world, but this was the first time she really was

able to experience it. Even for me, it was shocking.

We ought to work hard for God's glory and do everything without complaining and fighting.

We ought to love those who don't work at all and instead choose to beg and make excuses.

How do we teach our children both of these truths? These two lessons seemed to be colliding for Elin that particular November day as we walked away from their shack. Elin knew that Jean Claud was perfectly capable of working and providing for his family. Shouldn't he just go get a job? Aren't there plenty of jobs available in our town for unskilled laborers?

Yes. The answer is resoundingly yes!

Yet, we knew that the lesson couldn't stop there. We don't want our daughter to grow up in this culture seeing them as nothing but irresponsible, lazy beggars. We don't want nasty graffiti to confirm underlying suspicions she may already be thinking. Because we're convinced that's not the way to see them through the eyes of Jesus. So shouldn't we love them even if they're enemies of society? Shouldn't we love and help them even if they don't deserve it? Isn't that what grace is?

Yes. The answer is resoundingly yes!

Elin, how do you know it's important to work hard and earn money for the things you need?

"Because you and daddy work hard and get money."

So you have good parents who teach you to work hard? "Yes."

And how do you know that God wants us to work hard without complaining and fighting?

"The Bible."

So you know what God says because you have parents and grandparents and

friends and church people who teach you, right?
"Yes."

Fran and Jean Claud didn't have parents who showed them how to work hard. And they don't know Jesus. They don't know what God says in the Bible. They weren't taught to work hard. Their parents didn't let them go to school and learn. They were taught to beg instead. But who made them?

"God."

Yup. And do you think God loves them and wants them to know about Him? "Yes."

Do you think God loves you more than He loves them? "No."

Are you better than them just because you've been taught what's right? "No."

Right. God made them, too. And He loves them just as much He loves you. And they have value because they were made by God. So we want to help Fran and Jean Claud and their family because Jesus wants us to love and help them. We're going to help him get a job if he wants one so that he can buy a window for his family. But always remember that Jesus loves them just as much He loves you. And we always want to show them what Jesus is like by loving them and playing with them and being their friends. We are not better than they are.

This Thanksgiving season we are grateful for so many things. Our children have gotten an even deeper understanding of their many material blessings. And yet the biggest blessing of all is that Jesus came down to save us all. The sign *should* read "Death to the <u>People</u>," because we are all at enmity with God as we have rebelled against Him. We have been lazy and ungrateful and self righteous and immoral. And yet Christ has changed the message.

"Sa va traiasca Tiganilor."

Life to the Gypsies.

And to the rest of the world, through the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.
